A major UK logistics company has been fined £640,000 for accidental nicotine poisoning. Dangerous goods carrier Leighton Rogers was fined by the Health and Safety Executive after an employee administered a nicotine patch to a customer, causing him to develop an acute nicotine overdose. The nicotine patch was being used to treat the customer's chronic medical condition, but it was not registered in the UK for that purpose. The company had failed to keep the patch out of the reach of the employee, according to the HSE. Dangerous goods carriers are generally involved in transporting dangerous goods, which are designated under the Dangerous Special Substances Directive and include chemicals, medicines, food, vaccines and biological products. Leighton Rogers' managing director Robert Fowler, who was representing the company, said the case "centred around a direct medical error". "The company did not intend to cause harm and took steps to mitigate the situation. "It is important to note that only trace amounts of nicotine remained on the patient's skin and in the lymph system and that the patient did not suffer any lasting consequences. "The company is extremely sorry that this case occurred and has taken this incident very seriously." The HSE said Leighton Rogers had admitted some of the charges, namely that it failed to keep dangerous goods out of the reach of the employee and that it had failed to carry out an effective risk assessment.
